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

Being touted as the next Panda it is a car that can be customised and upgraded with different battery packs ranging from 100km to 500km which can be changed in 5 minutes. The interior is designed for owners to customise with a patented interlocking mounting system. Our Caffe di sabato for April was to the home of member Ric Volpi out at Bullengarook. Most of us met at the outbound BP just near Calder Park and travelled in convoy to Ric's. A few others joined later going direct.

Ric has a passion for his Italian heritage and displays this by setting up his 20 acre property with a modest but practical house, an adjacent growing garden, a work shed and a restored barn building, with land area for expansion into a vineyard in the future.

Ric proudly showed us through the restored barn explaining how he and Lisa have managed to keep the original steel framework and build around this with second hand materials, many of which are from old/heritage buildings. They have turned this open space into a wonderful airy entertaining space with open fire and an impressive outlook to the rear of the property (future vineyard?)

His work shed contains two 124 Spiders in various states of restoration and the frame of a 3 wheeled Piaggio delivery van. In a carport beside the work shed is a 124 BC also in need of resto. Ric likes to turn his hand to most of the work himself and has recently purchased a panel wheel. He is just learning how to use this at the moment and has been able to create some panel sections for some small projects so far.

In the barn we were treated to a variety of pastries and nibbles along with coffee made by Ric himself on his classic (1960's?) Gaggia coffee machine which he picked up at a trash and treasure market and restored. It was a beautiful machine (work of art) and produced wonderful coffee.

It was a very pleasant morning with Fiat friends in the fresh air near Mt Macedon and we would like to thank Ric and his wife Lisa for their hospitality and welcoming us into their home.























Fiat 501 Centenary by David Stott

David Stott is the owner of a magnificent 501 that featured in this year's Autobella and at the Fiat Nationals. David's car has been in the Stott family since it first arrived in Australia so he is well qualified to tell the story of the models history. This car was bought new by his Grandfather, and sold by Garret's in Sydney where the body was built. It served as a family car for 15 years until being cut down to a ute, and used in this form until 1960. Interestingly, it has been a restored tourer now for 19 years, longer than it was a tourer originally.

To quote All the Fiats " ... the 501 is an important model in Fiat history; not only because it was the post-war Fiat introduced by Fiat in the small capacity class; but also because of its unequalled commercial success on an international scale. It was built in several variations and obviously with several types of body work; the range included sedans, tourers, sports, roadster, and taxi versions. Front wheel brakes were fitted to the last series"

David continues...the 501 was designed by Carlo Cavalli, a lawyer, (this is the reason why the 501 was often called the Lawyers car) and was Fiats first attempt at a mass produced car. Previously the company had made large expensive cars and the 501 was their first small car for the mass market.

"It was so simple it could be repaired by the village blacksmith, so solid it could serve on farms, so generous it could endure the most extreme sports preparation" "This was supposed to be the popular post WW1 car, not too small so as not to incur the frailty of the cyclecar, and not too big to incur the rigors of the tax department."

The 501 also turned the company's fortunes around. In 1921, Fiat made a marginal profit of 20,000 Lire, and by 1922, with 501's pouring out of the factory, the profit was 19 million Lire. The 501 put Fiat on a good financial footing for coming years.

By 1923, 60% of all Fiat production was exported, and this would include mostly 501's. Sale of the 501 in Australia by the 'Imperial Preference' import duty which

was higher for goods not produced in the British Empire. Even at the higher price the 501 was apparently considered good value and they sold well and Australia was one of the strongest export markets for Fiat product. Like most cars from this period, the chassis and engine were imported and the body was locally made. Most were built as tourers, which were popular here and suited our climate. Sedans were generally Italian factory built, on the narrow track chassis and fully imported. Richard Unkles' taxi, and the blue sedan at Autobella are examples of the factory built sedans. These Italian bodies included extras such as silk roller blinds, cloth upholstery, ash trays, and pipe holders.

Most 501's in Australia tend to be the wide track versions which were available from 1923, and very few of the very early models or fully imported tourer bodies on the narrow track exist.

The 501 had a reputation for smoothness, durability and being easy to drive, with even a novice able to make silent gear changes.

From 1919 the model had flat mudguards as seen in the photo above, and by 1922, rounded mudguards appeared. In 1924, front brakes became an optional extra.

Approximately 45,000 were built in the 7 years from 1919–1926. Fiat introduced the S and SS versions in 1921.

Improvements were made during the model's life, including a new style oil pressure regulator and filter and a detachable exhaust manifold. The wide track model from 1923 (501C) was developed for Colonial markets such as Australia, South Africa and New Zealand, and included a lighter and stronger chassis.

In Australia the 501 was a relatively upmarket car, costing more than double a T model Ford of the day. It seems they sold well as many people today remember 501's owned by family members in the past. By all reports they were well regarded.

The radiator magnet on the D'Alton 501 was a nice touch to personalise the car. This was found a long time ago by their father, Ray D'Alton, who undertook most of the restoration of a clearly low mileage car

The Deaf Children Australia site also has plenty of lovely areas to sit and enjoy the surroundings, and the BBQ food and a children's playground to keep the young ones amused Although the weather on the days before the event and the prediction of rain on the day (even though it turned out to be dry all day) had an effect on numbers to some extent, but the number of cars entered in the various categories was close to last year' entries. 
