

Of Macclesfield, formerly of Murray Bridge. Aged 78 years.

An intelligent man, who was quick witted and doggedly determined. He will be deeply missed by all who knew him.

'Passion' knows many forms. For those of us who are passionate about our Italian-made cars, it may be directed to one particular marque, or even one particular model - Fiat's 501, 508, 1100, 500, 2300, X1-9 and even the oft-unloved Regata.



But Roger Ingerson loved them all. We met when I purchased his two Lancia Flavias, his eye having turned to Alfa Romeo. But during our long friendship his voluminous shed was filled with Fiats, Alfas, Lancias and even a Maserati – all of them subject to his meticulous workmanship and care.

But his greatest love was undoubtedly reserved for the Fiat 850 in its many guises, of which he owned and superbly rebuilt several, even though Roger Beattie could not be convinced to add his 850 camper. He acquired a number of 850 Sport coupes, one of which he built for competition, and found an 850 Spider (designed by Giugiaro), but never succeeded in his wish for an 850 Lombardi.

Roger strongly supported the evolution of what became South Australia's Auto Italia all-marques display from 2012, an annual event which grew from the All Italian Day in which he actively participated. He was an early and enthusiastic member of Adelaide's Scuderia Italiano group.

Always welcoming and helpful to fellow enthusiasts, Roger's enthusiasm for his charges was palpable, and wife Carol's support unwavering. On March 17th he lost his battle with the cruel blood cancer, myeloma, and was farewelled at a funeral in Mount Barker on March 27th. Fittingly his 850 Sport and 850 Spider were in attendance.

Our sincere condolences are offered to Carol and their extended family. The Italian motoring scene in South Australia and indeed across Australia, is poorer for Roger's passing.



On the 25th of February I competed in Round 2 of the Victorian Motorkhana Championship at Westmere on the dirt in my Abarth. Everyone competing struggled to get traction and there were many flag and wrong direction penalties but we were having so much fun spinning around in the mud that we didn't care. The next day we returned for Round 1 of the Victorian Khanacross Championship and the weather had improved slightly. It still rained a bit, but we got some sun and the ground dried up just enough to kick up dust. It wasn't my best weekend as far as championship points because I got so many penalties, however I had fun and learned a lot about racing the Abarth in the dirt.

Phillip Island Classic was held from Thursday 9th-Sunday 12th of March, where we had Philip Buggee competing in his 124 Spider Abarth and Ernst Luthi competing in his Alpine Renault A110. Raymond Ostenberg in his Lancia Beta Coupe. It was a very windy and wild and hot day at Sandown but I managed to keep my Abarth on the black stuff (tarmac) and got a new PB of 1:46.5418, my nominated regularity time was 1:48.

We had a awesome time doing the tests which were actually a practice run for their upcoming MG nationals. 


Competition Report

Competition Report



Early March was the selected time for the three-day Phillip Island Classic. This is an event for classic race cars, a 1928 Alfa as the oldest car that I saw in the pits, while there were some magnificent retired F1 cars, Indy Cars, F5000's, ex Le Mans Sports cars, Formula Fords, touring cars and what we were there for, Group 'S' Sports Racing cars to name just some of the almost 600 cars competing.

FCCV had two members competing, Ernst Luthi was driving his Renault Alpine, while Phil Buggee was driving his 124 Spider, both entered in the second group in Group S Sports Cars, fortunately not mixing it with the faster V-8 Corvettes, Mustangs and the Turbo Porsches. With about 60 entries just in Group S, it had to be split into two run groups, with only one qualifying session on Friday morning, followed by one race in the afternoon of the five races over the three days of the meeting.

Not too hot, it was an ideal weather weekend despite the three-quarter cross head wind coming from right to left on the main straight. There were spirited battles all through the fields of cars, with Ernst battling with a Sprite while Phil was chasing a 911 Porsche and a Triumph GT-6, catching up to them through the corners, only to see them slightly pull away on the straights, every lap. Possibly because of the two carrots dangling just in front of him, Phil was able to set a personal best lap time, with many others only just a few tenths slower. Both the Alpine and the Spider are former Targa Tasmania cars and are built and tuned for that style of motorsport, not out and out racing events.

Ernst was supported by Sonja as pit crew, while Phil had Bill, Shayne and Paul pit crewing on the Spider. Friday, Saturday and Sunday we had support and pleasant visits from many FCCV club members who dropped by our pit crib to catch up between races. That was very much appreciated by all of us involved in keep the two cars ready for the next race. Then just one week later, Phil had this same Spider displaying at *Autobella*, entered in the competition car category. On the same weekend as *Autobella* was the Rob Roy Revival, an event to celebrate the spirit of old-time hill climbing and as his Renault Alpine had also survived the stresses of PI, Ernst was certainly enjoying driving on the newly upgraded Rob Roy track.



Main topic this time is the Fiat 510S model which was made from 1919 to early 1925. These have a 6 cylinder side valve engine of 3.446cc attached to a 4 speed gearbox and was derived from the standard Tipo 510 model. Only 414 article on this car later this year. were made of the 510S whereas it had an extra 7hp. The Tipo 505 Fiat used many of the same components, such as steering, gearbox and differential, but was a 4 cylinder of the same 75mm x 130mm bore and stroke.

Phil Jeeves has finished his 510S in Christchurch after nearly 10 years of pretty solid work. He only had parts of the body and Only refinements to go are minor instrument changes to satisfy the purists. Beaded Wheels, the magazine of the Vintage Car Club of New Zealand, has undertaken a thorough article in their February issue. Phil entered for the annual Art Deco event at Napier in February as the first real opportunity to show it. They managed to get across the Cook Strait to Wellington only to find that the Art Deco was cancelled due to the appalling weather that hit Napier. Returning would seem simple, except that of the 6 ferries that run only 1 was fully operable and the other was taking

commercial vehicles and the train but no persons, due a previous complete breakdown in the Strait, Last heard Phil's car was still stuck in Wellington. We intend to bring a fuller

Ross Burr's Fiat 510S On the topic of Fiat 510S cars. the 510S that was restored by Ross Burr in Mildura in the 70's and early 80's has come up for sale by auction. Locally Ross sold it to another chap in Mildura who sold it to a person who was obviously a spotter for someone in Italy. At the time it sold for around \$50,000. This time it was officially estimated at €5,000 to €5,000. It sold for €5,001. Looks like it has not changed at all since leaving here perhaps 12 years or so back and has not been heard of or sighted since leaving Australia. The most notable aspects of the car is the simplified rear treatment that has the hood external to the body and the well based wheels rather than the 895 x 135 Beaded Edge wheels fitted at the factory. Steering is heavy enough with the BE wheels, let alone these 6.00 wide tyres. The following photo was taken at the WFC Rally to Swan Hill in 1987.

AUTOBELLA

The most eye catching car for your scribe at Autobella was the extra nice Fiat 500A of Yolanda Mansfield. This is a car with a history and is well worth an article in the near future. This was imported from Malta some 60 years ago by a Maltese electrician. The car has had minor fettling over the last year since changing ownership to Yolanda and being shipped from Jimboomba (near the Gold Coast) to Colac. Perhaps the owner realized that the distances here are so much greater than Malta, but he never registered it here. It obviously was carefully looked after in Malta before his ownership and not damaged in WWII where Malta was fought over in a long and arduous campaign by the Axis forces. Yolanda managed its Permit a week prior to Autobella. This car is just 85 years old and


so beautifully original we understand why Yolanda fell in love with it.



Flogging Fiats in the 1920's

Seems Fiat was very organised when it came to selling its products in the 1920's. The following shows some items of their sales materials and expectations. The following break up of the expected time allocation for a Fiat salesman comes from a 1926 publication. Along with this time allocation was a list of 174 different types of prospective buyers from Acid Manufacturers to Wine Merchants and everything in between from Funeral Service Contractors to Slaugherhouses.

The following letter from the Paris office to 509 owners may not be what it seems. It mentions concerns for having the brakes sufficiently adjusted but the real intent may be different. At this time Fiat was aware of the problem with inadequate oil supply to the front main engine bearing and may have been checking the oil supply. The deficiency tended to be made up by the depth of the cross hatching of the bearing surface which was done manually. If not deep enough it would run #2 big end or worse, throw a con rod.

Head gaskets for Tipo 501 and 503 should be in stock by the time this issue is published.

Fiat 509 oil pump drive gears have been mentioned as a possible requirement. If you know of any requirement please contact your scribe at richard@unkles.com.

During the first month the examination of some parts is, sometimes, advisable. This work requires but a few minutes, but increases the efficiency of the car and avoids future accidents.






