

It's been another busy few months of competition with even more ramping up towards the end of the year. On Sunday September 3rd we had a few FCCV Members taking on Round 9 of the Group 5 Motorkhana at Geelong Motorsport Complex in Avalon. Tony Russel, Paul Freame, Bill Freame, Mark Freame and I all had a great time. Tony Russel absolutely had the Panda out for battle making the Mini drivers nervous, he ended up finishing 1st in Class F, well done Tony! I finished 1st in Ladies Class and unfortunately the Freame family had to leave after lunch but managed to get some good practice in for the Nationals.


On Saturday September 9th I competed in one of my most challenging Regularity days ever at the MSCA Sprint at Phillip Island. The night before on my drive up to the island I was driving in the dark when it was windy and raining heavy and hit a pothole with my front right wheel somewhere before Koo Wee Rup. My poor Abarth was suffering from vibrations in the steering making it challenging drive to my accommodation. I was driving with my race set of wheels on with my Nangkang AR 1 semi slicks. I checked the tyre pressures in the morning, and they were all good, so a bit of relief that I didn't have a flat, but the vibration was still there. When I got to the track, I managed to last minute book a garage





because I had previously thought we were going to have good weather, I was wrong. I did my first session very slowly in the wet and by the second session the rain had eased off and I was able to pick up a bit of pace but not as fast as I normally would have given the situation. Surprisingly I was very consistent and got second place in regularity for the session. During lunchtime Robert Judd, Sam Mazzeo and my dad helped me swap the front right with the rear right wheel and this helped settle the vibrations a bit. I then was able to get second place in regularity again and finished the day in one piece and made it home ok. The wheel was buckled, and I have since had it repaired ready for my next race on October 22nd.

On September 15th I took part in Girls on Track with Motorsport Australia at Sandown. I assisted the team as a mentor to young girls and ladies who were interested in learning about careers in motorsport. I really wish something like this was around when I was younger. The program offers an exciting opportunity for the participants to meet women in the industry and learn career path skills not only for racing but the overall business of motorsport. The highlight of my involvement of the day was teaching the primary school girls how to change a wheel on a small race car. This was so important to me because I didn't learn to change a wheel until I was in my 30s. These girls have an awesome head start. Additionally on the Sunday I was asked by Motorsport Australia to be Buddy for the Women's Introduction to Motorsport Program at METEC in Bayswater. This event was purely for women who were looking at getting a start in grassroots motorsport. I was joined by Petrina Astbury form the MSCA and Clara Sperandio from AROCA as mentors for the day. Through the Abarth Club of Melbourne I managed to get two participants





entering the event, Jade Edwards and Mai Di Loreto who has family members in the FCCV. I also took this opportunity to advertise our Come and Try Motorkhana which resulted in a few entries to our event.

On Sunday September 17th Robert Jorgensen competed in the Gippsland Car Club multi-club Khanacross at Bryant Park. He competed in his Red Fiat 500 and finished in 21st Place. Thanks, Rob, for representing our club at this event. On Sunday September the 24th Ian Maud was out at Bryant Park competing in the Gippsland Car Club multi-club hill climb in his X19. Ian finished 3rd in his class, well done Ian!



Ian Maud in his X19 got himself in an exciting battle with some Mustangs and finished in 31st position with his fastest time of 0:58.503. Mario Di Censo in his Abarth finished in 48th place with his fastest time of 1:01.656. Then we had two club members very close together with Tony Romeo in his Abarth finishing in 58th place with his fastest time of 1:03.089 and then Frank Caia in his 124 Spider finishing in 58th place with his fastest time of 1:03.613. Well done team FCCV!

On the same Sunday at very last minute, I entered the Western Districts Car Club Motorkhana. It was a small field of only 11 competitors and due to low capacity, we finished at lunchtime. But in saying that it was a fun event where we did head-to-head battles of long motorkhana tests side by side up the skidpan. We got two runs of each test swapping sides and our





best time of the two was the one that counted. I got second place in class A.

I just want to take this opportunity to say how proud I am of our competitors this year. We have had FCCV competitors in a range of events in 2023 Sprints, Regularity, Hill Climb, Khanacross, Motorkhana etc. Also, quite a few of us have had mechanical health issues, issues, crazy weather at events and all sorts of other challenges but will still push through and show up. 



Vale John Westcott

1935 – 2023

It is with great sadness that we learnt that our dear friend, John Westcott had passed away. John was a longtime member of FCCV. He joined in the 1990's and owned a wide range of veteran, vintage and classic cars, Fiats and other marques. We have asked John's son, Peter Westcott, to tell us the story of John's amazing car journey.

"I can remember there was always an "old bomb" of one sort or another in the garage. He liked interesting cars but I think his interest was less about driving them than finding "forgotten" cars and the process of rejuvenating them. He was always on the lookout for 'orphans" and has an uncanny knack of tracking them down. Sometimes, as with the Jowett Bradfords and the 2300 Familiare, he'd buy them to save them from being scrapped, and then find someone who wanted them. I don't think he made any money worth speaking about from his hobby, he pretty much had to sell one to buy the next."

Cars he owned for many years

Austin 7 he owned from 1967 – 2023. Some hung around, like the MG he had for 20 odd years, because he never had time to work on the restoration. Apart from the Austin 7 there was never really a keeper.

HIS FAVOURITES

1938 W143 Mercedes 230 Cabriolet, the first car he had to have, but was sold to pay for the garage floor for the new house in 1964 (would be worth Euro 200,000 today). The Austin 7 was the hardest to let go.The car he was most proud of was the Aston Martin and finishing the Granluce before he became too ill to work on cars, he considered a great achievement. He didn't have any specific favourites and would "take them as they come" in his words.

He rarely kept track of where the cars went but I know the Austin 7 now resides in Eden, the Aston Martin went to Switzerland and the Mercedes is a now restoration project in Canterbury (Vic)

John's mechanical skill were pretty much self-taught – he learnt by doing the MG TF, which was probably the best in Australia at the time. His first motoring experience was as a seven year old in Perth where a neighbour who had lost his left arm in WW1 and

had difficulty driving his Austin 7, so John would accompany him on his weekly shopping trips and change gears for the digger!

Peter tells us that his dad regularly visited aged care home and give the oldies joy rides in the Singer, Austin 7 and the Talbot. Ironically most of them were younger than him!! "

Those of us who knew John will remember his passion for his cars, both Fiats and others, his quiet manner and sense of humour, and his amazing self-taught restoration ability. We always enjoyed his visits, most recently in his modern red 500, or, on occasions, in one of his restorations. We got to go for a ride in the 1900 Granluce on one visit and of course, loved the fact that he was also an X1/9 fan, having owned four, over the years. We also loved out lunch catch ups with John and Daphne, where things other than Fiats were the topic of conversation. We will miss you John and your amazing contribution to the restoration of some fabulous cars that may well have ended up rusting away in old sheds or in paddocks. Your contribution to our automotive history should be recognised and applauded.

David Stott, Rob Poynter and your scribe have all entered in next years' Spirit of the 20's Rally over 9 days in south east Victoria and NSW. Rob is planning to take one of his 501's, David reports that the Itala is now much easier to start with the overhauled magneto so he intends to take the Itala rather than the 501C and your scribe will take the taxi. We will be welcoming John Hebard from UK who has taken the opportunity to see some more of Oz and from a suitable vehicular carriage.

Here is a sorry story about Yolanda Mansfield's very original 1938 Topolino 500A.

"We had a little incident recently. We were towing the Fiat on an open trailer with the car facing forwards when a large semi-trailer passed us whilst coming from the opposite direction in a 100km zone on the Hamilton Hwy. The gust of wind it created caught the driver's side suicide door and flung it completely open....it broke the strap that normally prevents the door opening past 90 degrees and then also broke the lower door hinge. Amazingly there was minimal damage to the door itself (unless it's distorted slightly but visually doesn't appear to be and still closes OK), nor was there any damage to the rear wheel arch fender or rear panels. I suspect the strap took a great deal of the momentum off the door's travel before it broke."

So they need a replacement RH lower door hinge for her car. Can anyone help?

Federation News

The quarterly meeting of the Federation of Veteran, Vintage and Classic Cars Inc was held on 14th October. Main items of note were:

- a) The Federation lost some \$20,000 last year due to the Victorian Government taking over the Bendigo Showgrounds for those displaced by the Rochester floods so the Bendigo Swap was cancelled. Reason given for no compensation being paid by the govt was that no physical damage had occurred, though expenses had been.
- b) New buildings for table tennis are proposed for the showgrounds which may be adaptable for the Swap.
- c) Possible rerun in 2025 of the Shannons 2000 Rally to Canberra.
- d) Money left over from the Shannons 2000 was used to create the Robert Shannon Trust which provides funds for your restorers to continue their projects. Latest grant has gone to a 21 year old for the restoration of a 1947 Triumph 1800 roadster.
- e) Electric Vehicles Vicroads are looking at a special RWC for these.
- f) Most clubs will be affected by the ATO's requirement that "Not for Profit" organisations will have to lodge tax returns if their income from anything other than subscriptions exceeds \$416. So the FCCV is definitely affected.

VicRoads Statistics

The following may be of interest. Victoria has 6.670 million cars registered. Of these some 5.5% are over 30 years old. Of those registered, 1.55% are on the CPS. Not that

CPS is applicable in Victoria for vehicles over 25 years old and not 30 years as in the other states. So collector cars are not a big contributor to CO2 emissions, especially once the low distances travelled by cars on the CPS are taken into account.

E Fuels

No doubt we will hear more of these with the passage of time. These fuels are carbon neutral (or close to) and so when used minimize CO2 emissions. In UK these are available in a few places at some 3 times the cost of normal petrol. The August edition of "The Automobile" has an article on this and refers to the use in a 1928 Sunbeam 16.9hp sedan. The owner reports minimal difference from standard petrol and the fuels can be missed with no problems. Here there are 3 organisations working on this, including Porsche which is using hydro power in Tasmania as part of the meeting of carbon free fuel requirements. Cost reduction is the main problem at present but do not be surprised if you are using these fuels in your classic in another 10 years. Certainly cheaper than converting the car to electric.

The Ballarat Swap will again not be held in February. Our understanding is a lack of a suitable site that Council will agree with. However the following are proceeding:

Barry Ellis Memorial EcoDrive in a 500E

The return of the EcoDrive in 2023 was an especially significant one, as it marked the running of this event, to the memory of one of its greatest supporters - Barry Ellis.

It is a fitting and entirely deserved tribute, as Barry had diligently honed his driving techniques over several decades, to extract the greatest possible distance, out of the least amount of fuel - with impressive performances in recent years, at the wheel of two Fiat Punto's – one of which was again in attendance on this year's run, in the hands of Tony Tyzack.

There was an excellent turnout this year with a strong dominance of Fiat models, spanning nearly 60 years of the brand's history. After over a decade of participating in this event in various vehicles this year I was fortunate to be able to return with another Electric Fiat – this time the latest 2023 500e Laprima.

Fiat 500 models usually perform well in this event by virtue of their compact size and weight – 500 twin air and Diesel models have taken out the honours in previous years as well as my own first generation 500e in the 2019 event. From a personal perspective-participating over the last decade, has provided an interesting benchmark of just how far Electric Vehicle technology has progressed during the running of this event.

In earlier years the EV entrants were unable to complete the entire course on one charge- now in the present day even a compact EV such as the 500e was able to complete the full route and flow with the internal combustion vehicles at posted speed limits, including travelling to the start and returning home on a single charge, with a comfortable reserve of over 100km remaining.

The weather was excellent and traffic minimal on a highly enjoyable route from Rowville via Pakenham to Lilydale of approximately 120km – the final figure is always dependent on the level of navigational accuracy achieved in traversing the route! It's a very enjoyable event where speed is of secondary importance to smooth and efficient driving techniques, over a wide range of terrain and conditions.



Comparison between different fuel and vehicle types through analysis of cost per kilometre always throws up some interesting surprises- this year the Electric 500 was most efficient followed by Deb Buggee in her 500X Crossplus and a creditable performance from Roger Beattie and Peter Kerr in the Fiat Scudo van. Shayne Williams was unable to add to his impressive collection of wooden spoons this year, in pursuit of the highest recorded fuel cost over the course, with a Mercedes snatching the 'honours' for 2023.


