

My automotive history hobby has led me into some interesting discussions over the year and of late they seem to be concerning the topic of 'conceptual authenticity' or more simply whether to preserve or restore. There seems to be an increasing push to preserve cars rather than restore them and the oft heard 'they are only original once' plays into these curatorial conversations despite any lack of clarity about what is being preserved, or indeed restored. Conceptual authenticity calls on the vision of the original design to be preserved along the lines of the ASI in Italy which disallows any departure from the original in issuing the fabled 'Gold Plate'. An alternate view is that the changes wrought on a vehicle throughout its existence and use are part of its history and thus should be embraced as a 'vehicle' for the artifact's social history contribution. Here is Australia we seem to have a more laissez faire approach to vehicle ownership, modification and use.

We don't have the American obsession with 'matching numbers' nor the European drive for purity but it is only through continued engagement with peak bodies and government that the rules we operate under will remain the same and allow our broad and varied classic car culture the space to exist.

Enough of my little existential crisis, lets move onto more fun and interesting topics. 



Winton Festival of **Speed Motorkhana**

5TH & 6TH AUGUST

annual Festival of Speed at Winton, the Victorian Historic Racing Register (VHRR) had invited the Victorian Motorkhana Panel (VMP) to supply over the event weekend, two motorkhana competitions to be held on the skid pan at the Winton circuit.

As has previously happened, the Saturday motorkhana would be a Group 5 organised event, with responsibility shared between Ford Four Car Club (FFCC) and Toyota Car Club Australia (TCCA) while the Sunday event would be Round 6 of The Victorian Motorkhana Championship and conducted by FIAT Car Club of Victoria (FCCV) who would be solely responsible for the competition.

A wet and windy Friday while leaving Melbourne had changed to a windless and dry Saturday for the first of the two motorkhanas. Two test fields were set up and the 44-entry field were divided into two groups of 22 in each. 12 tests were run, plus a final 'Head-to-Head' straight slalom where identical tests were set up side by side and two cars ran off against each other. All a bit of fun to end the day, with the loser of each run being eliminated.

Sunday morning was another cold early start and for the second day in a row, Alana Freame was left (in the cold) at the entry gate to hand out the tickets to the handful of motorkhana entrants who hadn't competed on Saturday.

As part of the motorsport entertainment during the For our Sunday event, Paul Freame was again Event Secretary, while Rob Judd and Bill Freame would share the Clerk of the Course (CoC) duties. Obviously, the tests chosen need to be from the motorkhana test book that lists all the eligible and recognised test layouts for championship competition. Also obviously, I hope, it would provide an opportunity for our officials to practice laying out the Nationals tests that we will be setting up for the FIAT of Italy Cup (FOIC) in October. Fortunately, much of the club equipment that we had used at Bendigo was transported to Benalla for use in this event








The Barry Ellis Memorial EcoDrive

With the recent passing of Barry Ellis, Life Member No 5. it was decided that a fitting tribute to him would be to rename this event as 'The Barry Ellis Memorial **EcoDrive**', especially as Barry enjoyed and was capable of squeezing maximum fuel economy out of any of his cars when needed. Barry was always a strong supporter of all the economy runs that he went on, so very successfully from the mid 1960's. I'm sure that Barry would be 'Tickled Pink' to be honoured by this club in this way.

The previous EcoDrive was a guick event substitution to replace the cancelled Autobella due to Covid restrictions in early 2022. Then with the Russian invasion of Ukraine and thus the drawn-out war that

is now between 'David against Goliath', as expected, that lead to fuel prices soaring well above what we had all become used to. High fuel prices don't bring out lots of participants to go on a run in the country, even a drive that is designed to encourage economical driving. Knowing where the event will start and finish is the first requirement, then with those points set, it's just a case of finding the best(?) ways to link them together, while covering a total distance of around 120 kilometres', a driving time of around 2 hours, with an average speed around 60kph. I like to use roads that are suitable for even the smallest engined cars in our club.

I decided to approach the Hungry Jack's at Rowville for the start location, having fuel next door, a large carpark and a big customer area. They were enthusiastic to have us assemble in their restaurant and the carpark full of classic cars. Eventually I decided to finish the event, with a meal, in the Olinda Creek Hotel, which is in the main street of Lilydale. This location gave us safe service road parking, to display the classic cars in front of the hotel and in full view of all the passing traffic.

After the cars had all departed, I thanked the staff at Hungry Jack's and proceeded off to a location that would take them about 85 minutes to get to. It's where Olinda-Monbulk Road (C406) leaves Monbulk Road (C404) and the cars would take about 20 minutes to return from the other direction along Monbulk Road (C404). That would give me an opportunity to photograph the cars I recognised as they turned into My search for suitable roads was entertaining. The cars were supervised at the refuel at 'Fast Fuel, Wandin' and then it was a short 10km drive to lunch at Lilydale for most of those that had been on the run. We had about 40 for lunch, in our own area and next to the fire place. It was such a mild day the fire wasn't lit yet. Paul transcribed the fuel receipts into an explanation sheet that showed how each crew had fared on the drive. We had a new 500E on this run and as had happened with previous electric vehicles on EcoDrive, there was a short cut option available, by deleting the loop, however, Damon elected to drive the whole course and still had enough battery charge available to easily get it home from Lilydale. This was a real-world comparison of an electric driving future for many of you, a modern electric 500E against mostly petrol cars and one diesel delivery van in the run!!! mix. Paul and Damon were in deep discussion to decide how much electricity had been consumed and how much it would cost to re-charge the battery back to full. That's a discussion well outside my comfort zone.

Ellis would have enjoyed the roads and consumed very little fuel to cover the whole distance. 

Below is a photo of the cars ready to race at the GP – Marks was probably one of these (main colour







'The Guide for Excursionists'¹ was first published in 1868 by a Melbourne printer H. Thomas, during a period of much prosperity. The term 'excursionist' was coined for an increasing affluent society that had the interest and means to partake in vacations and excursions. Tourism was born!

The Alpine Retreat Hotel (Alpine Hotel Warburton), was built as a 'grand' hotel in the old English Tudor style in 1885. As "Marvellous Melbourne" continued to boom during the 1880's, you could imagine the excitement of a new destination for excursioner's looking for more than a days outing to Mordialloc. By 1901, the Victorian Railways (VR) extended the Lilydale line to Warburton.²



With the FCCV's origins since 1957 as a club for likeminded motoring enthusiasts to gather for automotive inspired 'outings', it is really great to




