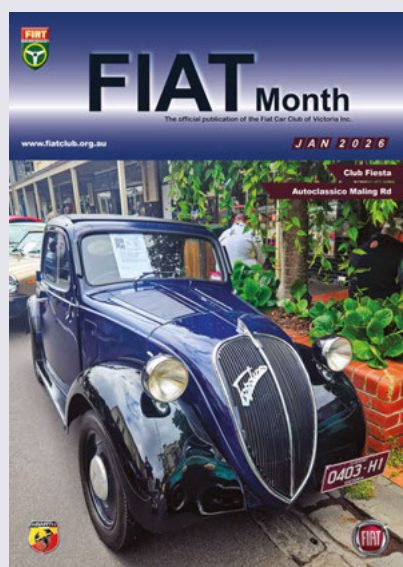

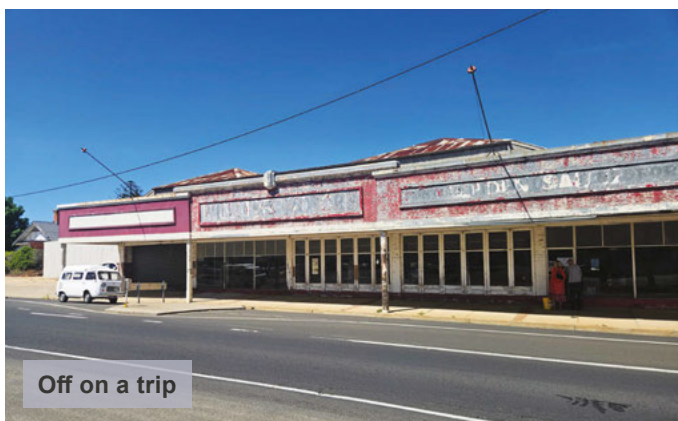
Maling Rd postponed event

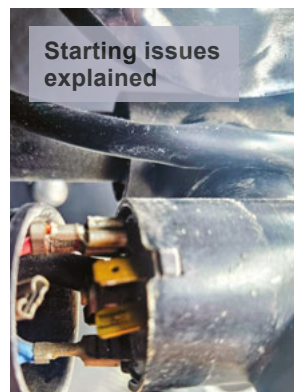



Off on a trip

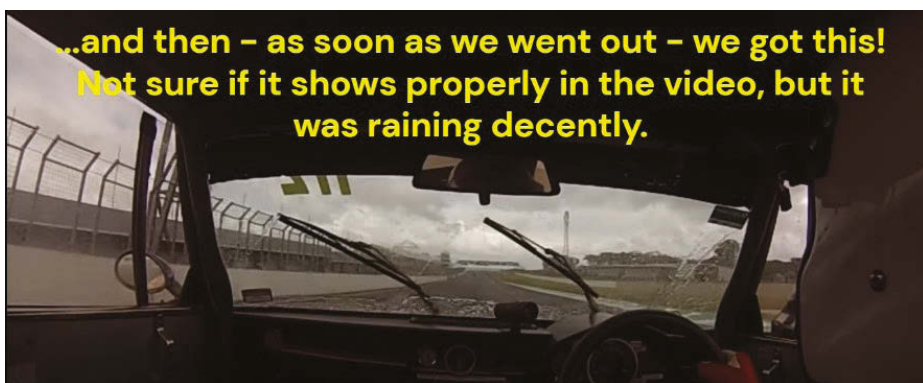

We parked near the carousel, a good place to see all the action. We left at 2.00 pm after a good day.

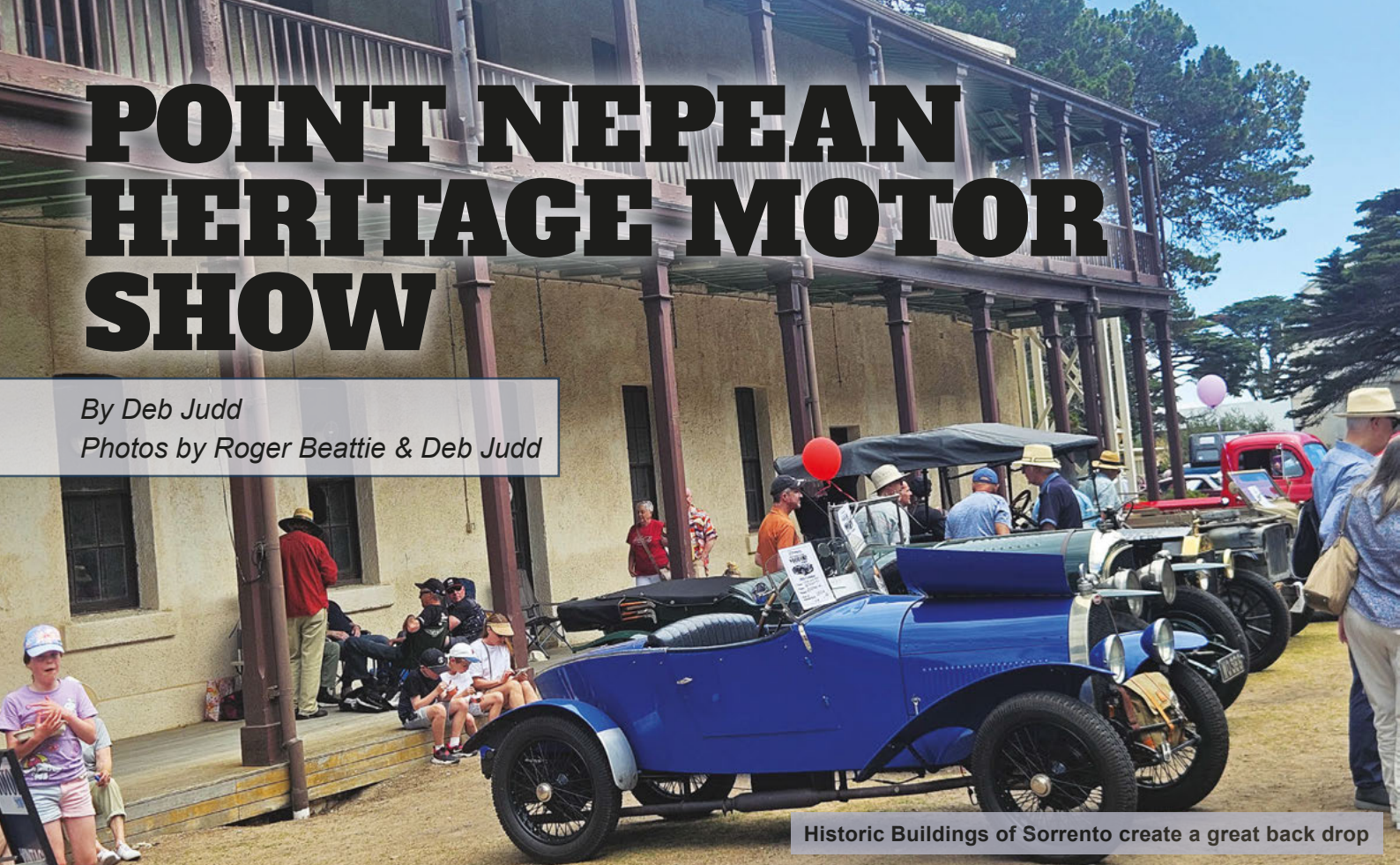

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A BLAST FROM THE PAST: BOB FONTI

Over the past few months I have been having a running conversation with club member Carlo Taranto who contacted me from overseas while enjoying time in Lipari, one of the Aeolian islands, the largest in fact at 37 square kilometres (about a third of Philip Island), that stretch north from Sicily to the seemingly constantly erupting Stromboli. There to visit relatives he found the time to tell me about Bartolo (Bob) Fonti and his exploits in the Fiat Car Club of Victoria during his time here in the 1960s.



Many of you will know the 600 Abarth campaigned in the past by Jack Waldron at many, many Targa events and before him by Dick Carlson, that car was imported by Wal Gillespie during this era while Bob was working with him and it might be the car that the Abarth replaced, a highly modified 600, that Bob drove to success in 1964 and 65. He seems to have had particular success in what I think of as the stutterers cup. That is not the real name but as the forerunner to the AOMC the A.O.O.M.C.C.O.V. is quite the mouthful.



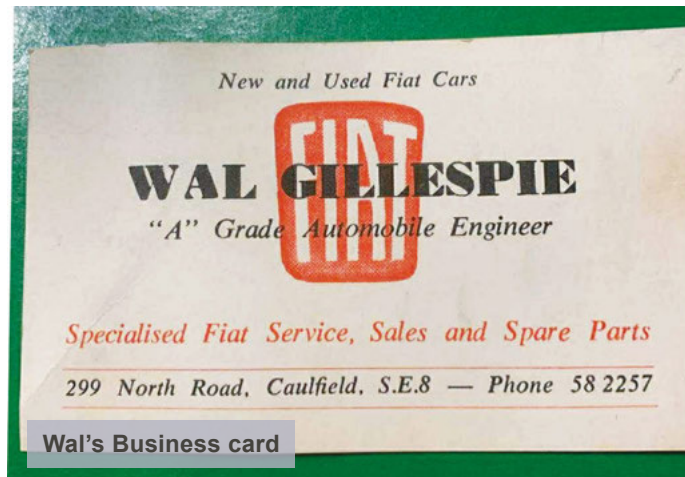
I am not offering a prize for the first correct entry defining the acronym although had I thought of it earlier you may have seen it in the December Nuts and Bolts quiz, The Association of One Make Car Clubs of Victoria conducted annual Sprint meetings and Bob won trophies in 1964/5 in the under 750cc class. He was obviously quite a feature at the presentations as someone even suggested he should keep the perpetual trophy. I found the page in an archival "Fiat Forecaster" (FIATmonth ancestor) from May 1964 featuring the day which also makes me admire the artwork done for the specific event on the page.

This from Carlo:

Bartolo (Bob) Fonti was born in Lipari, Italy, on 3rd January 1939. Bob is my late father-in-law's cousin. My wife Anna and I have visited Lipari several times, as recently as August 2025. Lipari is the largest of the seven Aeolian islands situated above the north east corner of Sicily. Bob studied automotive mechanics and achieved his mechanical Diploma in Lipari at the age of 19.

His brother (Nini) was living with their aunt in Australia. Nini drove trucks in Melbourne delivering tyres to Fiat dealers. One of those dealers told Nini that he was looking for an Italian mechanic. How timely!

Bob arrived in Melbourne on a Friday and started an Australian (Night School) Apprenticeship on the Monday under Wal Gillespie while working for Wal during the day.



This blossomed into a strong relationship both professionally and personally. Bob says that Wal was a knowledgeable and admired mentor and that Wal and his wife shared many dinners together; especially after Bob rescued her from cooking pasta in cold water! Wal often asked Bob "what are you cooking for dinner tonight Bob?" Bob said he was treated like a son.

In the early 60s Bob found himself with an opportunity to get into racing, and here is where Bob's love of Fiats began. Wal gave Bob the experience, the Fiat club gave Bob the opportunity to drive using his own car. Bob was always searching for an edge; he told me that in one of his races (even though it wasn't technically legal) he removed the windscreen washer reservoir and the spare tyre to lighten his car; Bob laughed and said "it saved two seconds on my lap time."

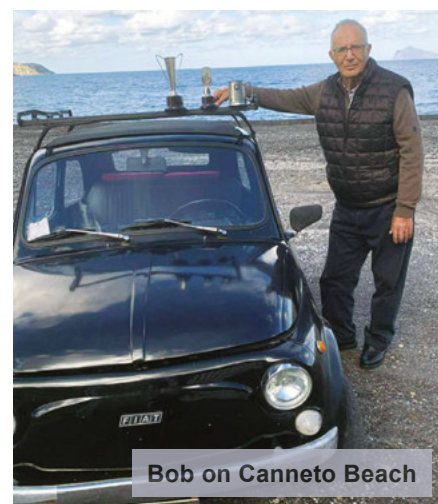
Some random additional points:

- Bob won several races and even the Perpetual trophy two years in a row



- Bob raced a Fiat 600 at Calder race. Because of Wal's association with Repco at that time, Repco supplied Bob with parts for his 600 which were Abarth spec'd. Bob drove the 600 he raced every day from his home in East Malvern to Wal's workshop in Caulfield...a true sleeper! He raced in a handicap race which included Bob Jane in an FJ.
- One of Bob's projects on his return was retrieving an engine from a crashed Maserati and installing it into a boat...Bob says it flew!
- Bob returned to Lipari in 1969 and had a mechanical workshop until the early 2020's.
- In the early 70's back in Lipari Bob bought and modified his black Fiat in the pic; changed the cylinders and conrods from the 495cc to those from the 590. He upgraded the valves in the head to those from the Panda which required head work to accommodate them. Engine size ended up 700cc and power went up from 11hp to 25hp.

As you can read Bob never lost the love of small Fiats and 'souping them up' even when he lived on an island less than 10km across the longest point. Of course that is exactly the sort of place the Nuova 500 was designed for and for Bob his 60 years of working on them has not diminished his enthusiasm.



Thanks Carlo and Anna for spending the time gathering the details to make this a story that spans both the years and the globe.

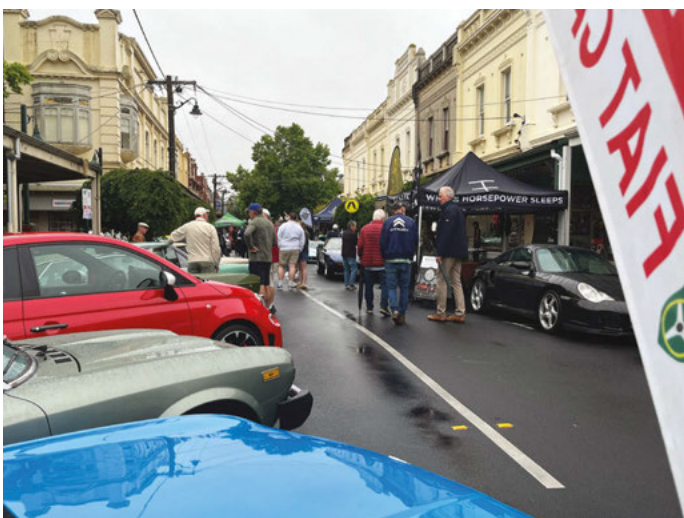

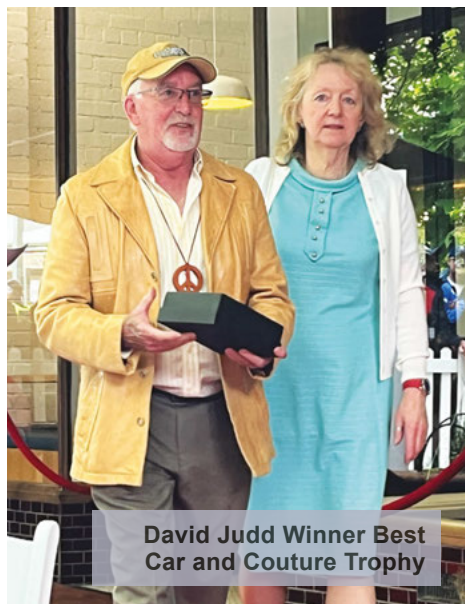

Paul Jones found a 501 switchbox with a good ammeter for only \$10 from a vendor who did not know its real value, plus another 19" well based wheel. He still needs to find more to transition from Beaded Edge. These preferred wheels are getting much harder to find now. Your scribe found 2 off MP4 magnetos that could be restored or used for spares cheap at \$30. A few tools including 2 Fiat ones were also found plus some close to period correct mirrors for another project.

Sam Biondo has sorted his magneto problem and returned the club's loan unit. Now thinking of bringing his 503 roadster on The Crossing next year.

In the Czech Republic Jaroslav Exner has been busy seeking original wheels for his 510 and found two very good ones in New Zealand. His veteran Fiat 15TER truck now has the rear covering finished which looks particularly good. He will be in New Zealand in March to compete in the 2026 Vero International Rally in a loan car. You can be lucky. Kevin and son Ben Wilby sorted fitting a windscreen to their Itala Tipo 51 Sports from parts mostly from a 1924 Dodge. The photo below shows the body scuttle shape is virtually identical even though the Fiat was built in Italy and the Itala by Floods in Melbourne. Even better news is that there are spares already cast in New Zealand for the two bottom pieces from the frame being loaned for copying over there some years ago.

David John has been readying his 503 tourer for sale as he has turned in his Drivers Licence. However Murphy's Law has suddenly applied itself. After running sweetly for more than a decade it started making a strange metallic noise related to the engine speed. Certainly not a bearing noise, and the nearest guess to the problem was the possibility that a piston had separated its skirt and it was bouncing around the con rod. However the real culprit was much harder to predict. When dismantling the #1 con rod was found to have two dents in it and #1 piston was scored.

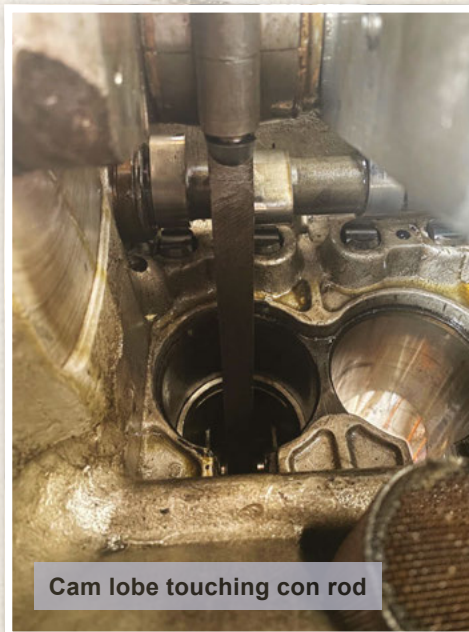
The other pistons were not marked but their con rods showed very faint evidence of being nudged by the cams of the camshaft.

The problem was found to be the incorrect insertion of the locking bolt that locates the camshaft by the centre bearing. Or more correctly the wrong positioning of the centre camshaft bearing in its location on the crankcase meaning it was in the wrong orientation by 90°. This meant that the rounded end of the location fixing bolt was not in the correct round hole but was in one of the wide slots which has allowed the camshaft to drift fore and aft from its correct location.

Lots of events coming up in the 2026 that will be of special interest to Tipo enthusiast. Hope to see lots of you at these events and showing off the remarkable range of fabulous vintage cars we have in our club.

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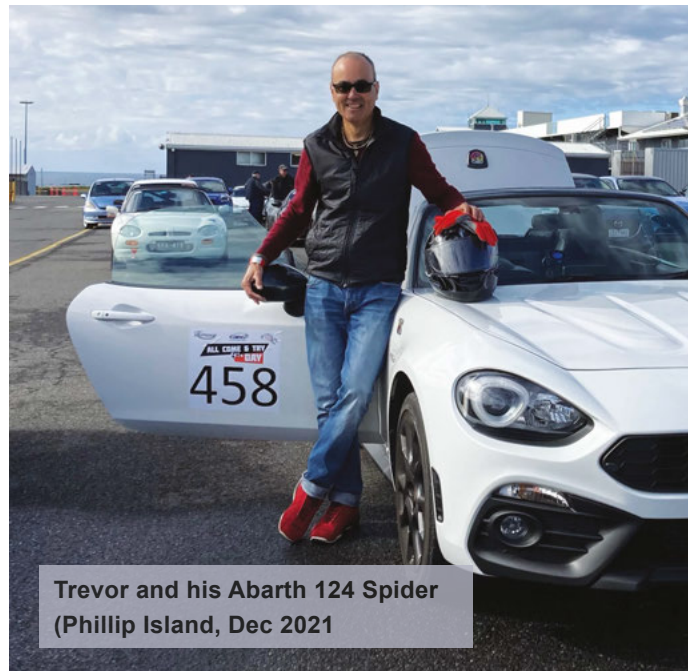
BALANCE IN MOTION

Having purchased my first Fiat in 1982, my formative years with the FCCV were between 1982 and 1986. A most beautiful 1977 Fiat 128 3P in a gorgeous light green called Marina Green. I fell in love with Marina and all things Italian, with her smooth lines, sloping hatch that tapered nicely to her elegant rear. The retro-tartan seats added style as you sat gazing out over her strikingly beautiful long nose.

My earliest car club experiences were competing in motorkhana's. I refer to such experiences in my book **Balance in Motion: Living in Natural Harmony with Parkinson's**. Below is an extract from chapter 14:

As the new kid on the block, I diligently unscrewed the button on my handbrake as instructed. With a group walk to orient ourselves of the first days Motorkhana 'test', the more experienced hands provided tips on how to achieve a fast time. It was 1982, at a time when our car club had access to a paddock outside the small farming town of Athlone in East Gippsland. With a front wheel drive car, often the fastest way around a flag (or cone) is to take a tight line and momentarily tweak the handbrake to slide the rear out, and in doing so, point the car in the right direction as you line up for the next flag. For many other flag markers, you are often best to loop the flags and maintain your momentum and speed. With a burst of noise we head for the home garage being careful not to hit the hay-bales.

Other cars of interest

Motorkhana's are not only a professional sport globally, but at a car club level provides a great environment for new drivers and kids from 13 years and onwards to gain invaluable experience and finesse for car control. On a competition day, there might be six or more different tests (layouts) to be memorised. Going around just one flag the wrong way will incur a WD (wrong direction) with the stop watch immediately stopped and with no time recorded for the run. Knocking over a flag/cone will incur a time penalty. I soon developed a reputation for accuracy and had many events with no WDs.

By 1985, Australia had adopted unleaded petrol, requiring all new vehicles to comply with new exhaust emission standards by incorporating catalytic converters. Accordingly, I seized an opportunity to buy a new Fiat 100's Regatta that had just become available.

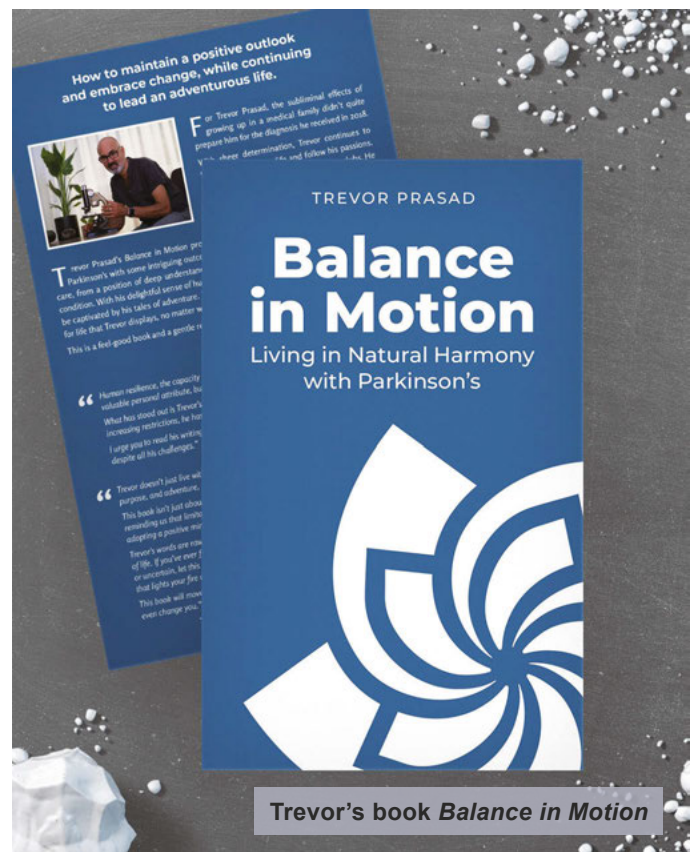
Following a period of being provided with company cars, I nonetheless had a number of fun cars along the way including an Alfa GTV 2.0 (1987), ZR Celica, Mazda RX-8 and a Renault Megane RS265 (Red Bull special).

In April 2019 I reconnected with the FCCV as I set my sights on purchasing a modern day classic, an Abarth 124 Spider (which I subsequently owned and enjoyed for 5+ years attending many club events).

My recently released book *Balance in Motion* is very much about "Tales of adventurers interspersed with neurological insights". A key theme throughout the book is the importance of community (hence my references to car clubs) and getting on with life no matter what life circumstances may present.

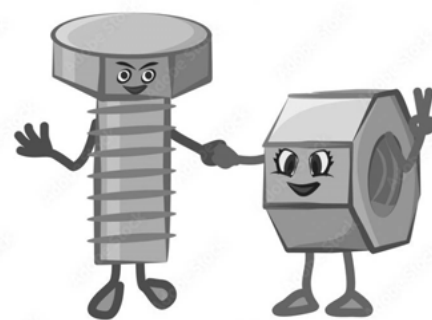
